# What is Ifor Ward?

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Ifor ward is where children go if they need more help to get better.

Some children go to Ifor ward from the emergency department.  
Some children go to Ifor ward from other departments in the hospital.



# What can I do at Ifor Ward?

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There is a playroom where I can play.

There are books, games and TV's.

There is a sensory room. There is a classroom which I can use during the day.



# Getting to Ifor Ward

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To get to Ifor Ward I can go in Lift A.

Ifor Ward is in the blue zone on level 4. I can follow signs to find Ifor Ward.



# Going into Ifor Ward

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I can go in the doors to the main Ifor Ward reception.

I will be staying at Ifor ward for a few days. The doctors and nurses can help me to feel better.

# Talking to reception

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I can tell the nurse that I am here. Someone can talk to the receptionist for me if I don't want to talk.

The nurse would like to know who I am. The nurse will tell me where my bed is.



# Sharing my hospital passport

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I can show the nurse my hospital passport.

My hospital passport has important information about me in it.



# Finding my bed

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After the nurse has written down my information they can show me where my bed is.



I might be in a room with other children. I might be in a room on my own.

# Nurses on Ifor Ward

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During my stay at Ifor ward I will have a Nurse looking after me. They will check on me regularly.

My nurse may change during the day and night

# Meeting my nurse

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My nurse will say hello and check my special name tag.



The nurse may check how I am feeling using a machine. They will do this every few hours. The nurse might give me medicine.

# About the Doctor

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There are also doctors looking after me. The doctors usually come together in the morning to see how I am doing.

My doctor might ask me questions. I can ask my doctor questions.



# Check-ups with the Doctor

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They may check my ears, mouth, chest and tummy.



They may put magic cream on my hands and arms to take blood.

# Things to know about Ifor ward

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I will get breakfast, lunch, dinner and snacks.



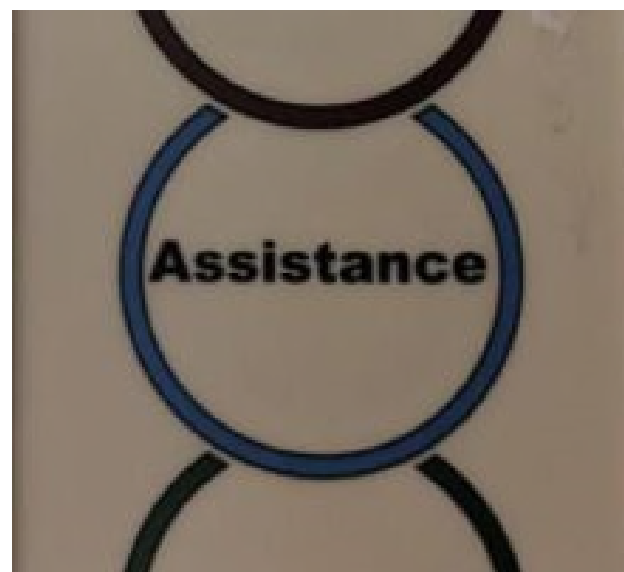
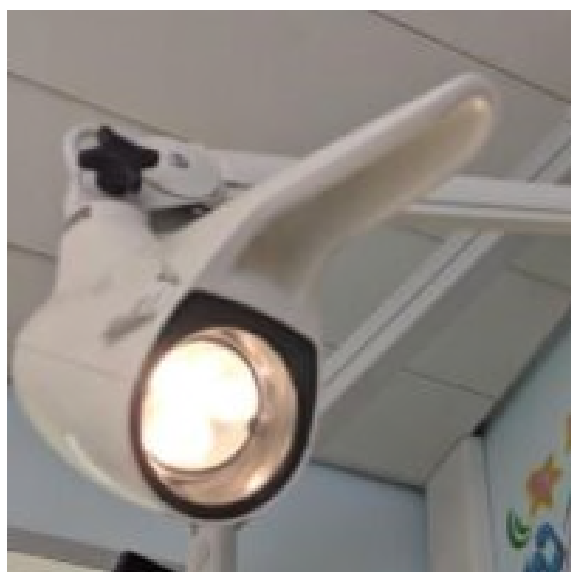
There are toilets and bathrooms.

I can press a button to tell the nurse I need help.

# What happens at night on Ifor Ward

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The lights usually turn off at 10pm. I can turn my light on.



I can read a book before I go to sleep. If I need help I can call the nurse by pressing my button.

# Getting medical treatment

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The doctor or nurse might check my height and weight.

If I need medicine they will give me medicine. The nurse can tell me what my medicine is.

The medicine might be something I swallow.



# Medical procedures

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I might need more than medicine to help me to feel better. The hospital staff might do a medical procedure to help me feel better.

Medical procedures include taking blood, x-rays and using equipment to look at the inside of my body.

# What happens next

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If I am feeling better I can go home. I might get medicines to take home. I may need to come back for a check up.



I can follow the signs to leave the hospital.
