



Reducing the risk of infection A patient's guide

Helping local people live longer, healthier lives. Infection free.

We want to make Whittington Health as clean and safe as possible for everyone.

We want to make sure that we identify patients who come into hospital or a health centre with infections, give them the appropriate treatment, as well as prevent any other patient getting an infection while in our care.

What are we doing?

- To minimise the spread of infection, we ask all our staff to clean their hands with alcohol
 hand gel or soap and water before and after touching a patient.
- Clinical hand wash basins are in every clinical area and there is alcohol hand gel by every patient's bed.
- We make sure that all our health care settings are clean and tidy by using dedicated cleaners during the day from 7am to 9pm and our matrons regularly inspect the wards and departments.
- We test patients for Methicillin Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus (MRSA) before they come in for routine operations and if they are admitted to hospital through the Emergency Department.
- We monitor and use antibiotics to prevent and treat infections that can happen after surgery or because of a medical condition.
- As soon as an infectious bacterium (like C.Difficile) is detected, patients may be placed in a side room to receive care, in order to prevent the spread of infection.
- All staff use a simple set of measures (called 'Standard Precautions') for every patient, at all
 times in the hospital. These precautions reduce the risk of infection in various settings,
 including when you are at home. Please ask a member of staff for more information on our
 'Standard Precautions'.
- All staff follow the 'Dress Code and Uniform Policy'. They must have bare arms below the elbow, no long sleeves and no jewellery, except a plain banded ring.



What can you and your visitors do?

Patients

- You should wash your hair and take a bath or shower as usual at home before coming in for surgery.
- Bring only what you need to the hospital. Our cleaning team must be able to access surfaces
 to clean. Cluttered patient lockers and tables and the floor space around your bed will prevent
 effective cleaning.
- Talk to the staff looking after you. It is okay to ask them if they have cleaned their hands before they touch you. It is okay to ask them if the equipment has been cleaned between uses, for example, the blood pressure machine.
- Always clean your hands after going to the toilet and before eating. You can use the
 designated patient's wash basin, or a wipe provided on the food tray. Ask for one, if it is not
 there.
- Make sure you take the whole course of your antibiotic treatment. Stopping too early or changing the routine can and does lead to resistances (the body stops responding to the antibiotics).
- If you have a urinary catheter (a flexible tube that drains urine from the bladder into a bag), an
 intravenous device (a tube that is inserted into a vein to administer fluids, medications, or blood
 transfusions), a drain or a wound dressing and it becomes uncomfortable or painful, please let
 your Nurse know.
- Do not touch your catheter, intravenous device, drain or wound dressings.
- Tell the staff if the bath/showers or toilets need cleaning.

Visitors

- When you arrive to the ward you must inform the Nurse/reception of who you are visiting. This
 is because there may be specific measures in the ward.
- You must wash your hands or use the alcohol gel before and after your visit.
- Unless you are responsible for caring for the patient, you will not need to use aprons or gloves.
- No more than two visitors at any time are allowed around the bed. Any children visiting must always be supervised by an adult.



- Do not sit on the bed.
- Do not visit if you are unwell, e.g. diarrhoea, heavy cold or flu. If you are unsure, please contact the ward/health centre before visiting.
